





# Training must be priority

### Director warns the industry faces crisis

HE OUTGOING regional director of the UK's largest contracting organisations is warning that the industry must act to secure its future.

Joe Hughes, who retires this month after more than 60 years in the industry, is concerned that not enough young people are coming into the industry.

'It used to be the case that son would follow father, but that has long since disappeared,' said Hughes, who is regional director of Darfen in Scotland.

'Now fewer and fewer youngsters are taking up the trade and we are facing a skills shortage that could spell disaster. It could be potentially crippling.

'Any sort of economic recovery drives up demand for labour and there simply isn't the people either wanting to come into the industry or being given the chance of a career path into the industry.

'Companies need to invest in staff not just for their own sakes but for the sake of the industry'

Tim Drew, director of FaCT, Fencing and Construction, said he concurred with Hughes' comments.

'In so many ways we agree with his comments and are very aware that there is a real need to recruit more young people,' said Drew.

However, he said that options were available and companies needed to engage with the opportunities that are available.

It is estimated the industry needs 500 new recruits each year.

# Nice gets into the fast lane as latest motors come into the UK

## Range offers nine separate options

HE success of an access control system is in the majority of cases judged on the opening speeds and that is exactly where specialists Nice has concentrated its development over the past two years.

Now the company is claiming that its new hi-speed motors launched this summer offer some of the fastest opening times on the market.

'In one case it is better by over 100 per cent,' said Alvise Brosadola from the Nice headquarters in Italy. 'The speed of opening is crucial to many and that's why we have been so determined to offer the best speeds possible. We really do believe that we have taken gate motors to a new level of operation."

It is no surprise that it was the South African market where this latest generation of motors was born where entry speeds are seen as key

to safety.
'Being a global operation means there is cross fertilisation and what is needed by one market today can become the product of another market tomorrow and such it is with these new hi-speed motors.

In total there are nine new motors that have been brought into the UK, powering gates weighing from 400 kilos through to 1200 kilos.

'It means there is a new high speed motor for almost every domestic, industrial and commercial application, each offering better opening speeds than have ever been achieved before. Like with the Run 400 which is 106 per cent faster on sliding gates than the non hi-speed Robus 400.'

Nice has launched four of the new hi-speed brands for the sliding gate sector and five for swing gates. The entire range uses a 24-volt power supply for ease of installation.

'While our goal has been to make the motors faster in operation, we have also made the motors contractor friendly and with the sliding gate motors there is the opportunity of using the Nice BlueBUS technology, allowing the control unit to be linked to up to seven couples of photocells control, security and signalling devices through just two wires. Also these motors for the sliding gates incorporate our own specialist obstacle detection system.

'Of course all the units conform to safety standards. Safety is a priority and that is why all our systems are compliant with the regulations and guidelines.'

With the new hi-speed range now available into the market place, Nice is offering one-to-one training and familiarisation courses to installers.

'While the motors are essential the same we are of course giving the fullest technical support to installers who feel they may require it. Of course, these new motors are fully 'O-View functional with the programmer system that allows for maintenance checks from virtually anywhere.

Making systems easy to install and user friendly is another priority for Nice. That is exactly the case with these new motors.



But the determination of Nice to cement its position in the market will lead to further new products this year with the company set to introduce its Era gate accessories into the UK - a new line of safety accessories for gate and door automation.

'As always we are continually looking at developing products to meet a variety of requirements,' said Brosadola -
